Clergy Care

- Clergy retreat
- Re-starting Communities of Practice (basically clergy support groups)

<u>Step 2 – Informal Interviews</u>

Members of our Team had conversations with people we knew, both clergy and lay, within our Conference to see which ideas resonated most strongly with them. This was not a survey of the entire Conference.

Step 3 – Decision on first steps

After gathering this information we had another meeting in August to narrow down where will initially put our energy.

Clergy Retreat

We will have a clergy retreat after Easter, April 7-9 (Sunday night through Tuesday afternoon) at Shannondale to coincide with the solar eclipse that will be happening there at that time. Details will follow, but our interviews revealed a mix of clergy who only want to attend gatherings with a clear learning component and those who want a retreat to be a time for renewal, so we know we need to include elements of both.

Congregational Revitalization

September 14, the Empowering Congregations Team had an initial online meeting with Cameron Trimble the President and CEO of Convergence, a non-profit that helps mainline congregations figure out how to reimagine themselves for the future. We don't have a specific plan yet, but watch this space.

Communities of Practice

This is a way to support pastors which we began several years ago, and which sort of fizzled out with the pandemic. The basic idea is that clergy meet monthly around a particular ministry interest or need to support and resource each other. In the past this was done with clergy resourcing each other, but the original practice involved having a paid facilitator. We are looking at both options. In particular we recognize the need to provide support for new clergy or clergy new to the denomination, and African American clergy serving historically white congregations.

Step 4 – You

The fundamental idea of Core Ministry Teams is not that this group of people do all the work, but provide leadership to make sure that things get done. Our small group cannot do all (or any) of these tasks alone, they require people throughout the conference stepping up, saying "yes" to ideas and programs we have planned.
